Can you describe and/or demonstrate the specific impact that TFN funding has had against your initial objectives?	<p>StreetDoctors Key objective: Reaching young people in Cardiff and Glasgow who are at risk of violence, and who currently do not have access to training in emergency life-saving skills.</p> <p>We now have successful and vibrant volunteer teams in Glasgow and in Cardiff. Funding from TFN meant StreetDoctors could achieve the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Appoint a temporary expansion officer dedicating specific time to identify champions at the medical schools in Glasgow and Cardiff - Scope potential delivery partners and build relationships with them ahead of the new teams becoming operational - Train 40 new volunteers from Cardiff and Glasgow in basic lifesaving skills, haemorrhage control, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, facilitation, safeguarding and legal issues at our national training conference in October 2016 - Offer on-going support and training to the new teams <p>Altogether Cardiff and Glasgow volunteers have taught 458 young people since October 2016, and delivered a total of 55 sessions. We have established 9 new delivery partners in this first year, including with youth offending teams, pupil referral units, secure units, youth clubs, a high risk school, and sports foundations.</p> <p>The Cardiff team got off to a strong start, as Welsh delivery partners quickly came on board with StreetDoctors approach. In Glasgow potential delivery partners took longer to engage. In response to this we launched an initiative to secure more Scottish delivery partners in November / December 2016. Both StreetDoctors' CEO and Medical Director visited Glasgow to personally broker delivery partnerships. As a result the Glasgow team now has regular delivery partners and the numbers of young people taught has steadily increased. New teams usually take a year to get established before completely hitting their stride, therefore we are delighted that the two new teams are on target to exceed the first year goal with regard to teaching numbers, and with two very strong teams now established we expect this to increase in subsequent years. TFN's investment will therefore have an impact far beyond this first year of funding.</p> <p>The end of session impact data indicates:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - 93% of young people understand the consequences of violence - 95% know what to do when someone is bleeding
